What do these pride flags mean?

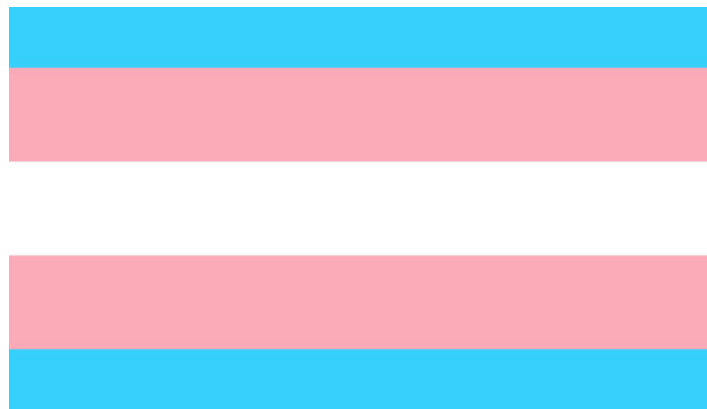


Progress pride flag!

This flag was created in 2018! It is a twist on the rainbow pride and a reminder of the progress the LGBTQIA+ has made and continues to work on.

**Black and brown – to represent people of color
Pink, light blue, and white – to represent trans, gender non-binary, and those across the gender spectrum!**

what do these pride flags mean?



Transgender pride flag!

This flag was created in 1999 and represents the transgender community! It shows pride for anyone who may not identify with their sex assigned at birth!

The blue and pink stripes represents the two colors typically assigned at birth. The white stripe in the middle represents those who identify as intersex, gender neutral or transitioning!

what do these pride flags mean?



Genderqueer pride flag!

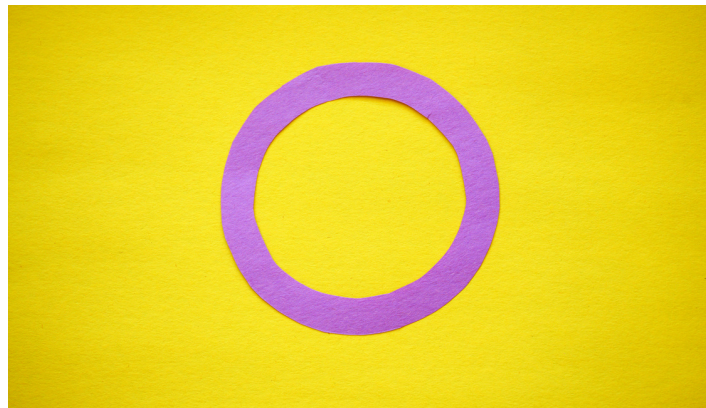
This flag was created in 2011! It shows pride for people who have a queer or non-normative experiences with their gender. It can also be used to describe any gender identities outside the binary!

Lavender – a mix of pink and blue which typically represent the binary women and men

White – agender or gender neutral identities

Green – genders outside of the binary entirely

What do these pride flags mean?



Intersex pride flag!

**This flag created in 2013.
It shows pride for the intersex community!**

People who intersex are born with bodies that fit outside our expectations of typical male and female!

The circle, perfect and unbroken, represents the wholeness of intersex people. It is a great reminder that intersex people are perfect the way they are!

what do these pride flags mean?



Nonbinary pride flag!

**The nonbinary flag was not created until 2014!
It represents people whose genders are not contained in
the typical binary of male and female!**

**Yellow – for identities outside the binary
White – for identities containing all genders
Purple – for identities that are a mix of male and female
Black – for those who identify as genderless**

what do these pride flags mean?



Genderfluid pride flag!

This flag was created in 2012 and shows pride for the Genderfluid community whose gender identity is fluid and may change and evolve over time!

Pink – femininity

White – all genders combined

Purple – both femininity and masculinity

Black – a lack of gender

Blue – masculinity

what do these pride flags mean?



Bigender pride flag!

This flag was created in 2014 and is one of the flags representing the Bigender community! People who are Bigendered or Dual-gendered have gender identities containing any two binary or nonbinary genders!

what do these pride flags mean?



Agender pride flag!

This flag was created in 2014! It represents a community of people who experience no gender! many Agender people feel genderless or genderfree!

Black and white – represent an absence of gender

Gray – represents semi-genderlessness

Green – represents nonbinary genders
